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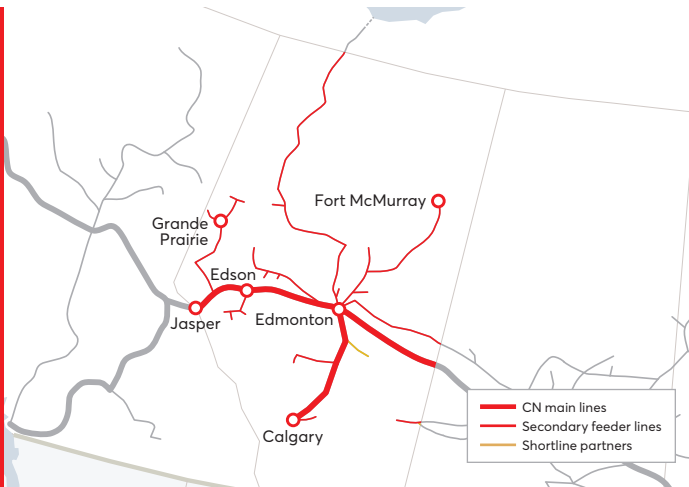

CN handles intermodal container traffic through our Edmonton and Calgary terminals. In Edmonton, where more than 2,200 CN railroaders live and work, we have automotive distribution and CargoFlo® bulk handling facilities as well as metals and forest products distribution centres. In Calgary, which over 300 CN employees call home, you'll find our logistics park, automotive, metals and forest products distribution centres, and a CargoFlo® bulk handling facility. Edmonton and Calgary are also home to rail yards. CN maintains large railcar and locomotive repair shops at Edmonton's Walker Yard. In Fort McMurray, there's a metals distribution centre and a CargoFlo® facility. We also have another forest products distribution centre in Edson.

New Energy Solutions

We continue to make significant investments in our corridors between Edmonton and West Coast ports to support growth in propane, chemicals and refined petroleum products. The Government of Alberta's incentive programs are encouraging the development of new petrochemical facilities in the province. Examples with direct access to CN's network include Imperial Oil, which is building Canada's largest renewable diesel facility (20,000 barrels per day -bpd) at its Strathcona refinery. Pembina is constructing a new propane fractionator at its Redwater Complex, which will increase capacity to 256,000 bpd.



The CN 911 training car was featured at the Calgary Logistics Park during the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' 2024 conference. Over 40 municipal leaders toured the yard and experienced some of the training equipment used by first responders.

Network Investments

Over the past decade, CN has invested about \$3.5 billion to build and maintain a safe and efficient network in Alberta and to support our supply chain partners. Expansion projects included the construction of new and extended sidings as well as double-tracking sections of our main lines. Maintenance projects focused on the replacement of rail and ties, plus upkeep of crossings, bridges, culverts, signals, and other track infrastructure.

Community Investments

In 2024, CN contributed to many Alberta-based organizations, including:

ALBERTA CONSERVATION ASSOCIATION ACA conserves, protects and enhances fish and wildlife populations and their habitats for Albertans to enjoy, value and use. CN supported the stocking of fish in local ponds and the hosting of Kids Can Catch events to help build stronger communities with healthier, happier people.

FREE PLAY FOR KIDS CN supports the Food to Play program, which helps disadvantaged children have the nourishment they need to participate in play. Specifically, the children receive a healthy snack each day and monthly food hampers. The program also provides nutritional literacy lessons to inform them about the importance of healthy eating.

ROYAL ALEXANDRA HOSPITAL FOUNDATION Indigenous people experience many barriers in accessing healthcare systems due to ongoing trauma and colonial social determinants of health. The Indigenous Cultural Partnership at the Lois Hole Hospital for Women directly confronts these challenges by intentionally seeking to decolonize and indigenize the healthcare practices at the Royal Alexandra Hospital in Edmonton.

SKILLS CANADA ALBERTA ASSOCIATION To help meet the future needs of industry, Skills Canada Alberta equips young students with the skills that will help Canada compete successfully in a rapidly changing world market. Specifically, CN sponsored the Girls Exploring Trades conference

MACEWAN UNIVERSITY pimâcihisowin means to create a life of independence. CN supports MacEwan's pimâcihisowin Foundation Program (PFP), a study program designed to address the gap between a student's current level of qualifications and the level needed for admission to a post-secondary program. The PFP is geared primarily toward Indigenous students and offers culturally appropriate education.
